VW KEITH FREDERICK 'FRED' CONNEW, PAST ASSISTANT PROVINCIAL GRAND MASTER

Tuesday December 1953 was a busy day for the Connew family for whilst Fred was in Auckland Town Hall having the British Empire Medal pinned on his chest by Queen Elizabeth II his wife Pat also had a special appointment. She was giving birth to their third son Alan.

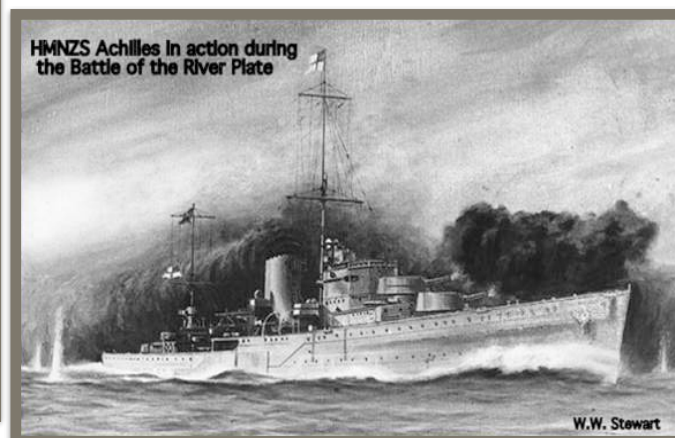
Fred was awarded the B.E.M for long service and good conduct whilst serving with the New Zealand Royal Navy. This was not the first recognition of his service with the NZRN. On 13 December 1939, off the coast of Uruguay, Fred was serving on HMS Achilles, later to become HMNZS Achilles, a Leander-class light cruiser, with 320 other New Zealanders amongst the ships crew. At 06:20 on that morning, Achilles, with two other cruisers Ajax and Exeter, engaged fire with the German Pocket Battleship Admiral Graf Spee. Exeter was badly damaged leaving Achilles and Ajax to force the Pocket Battleship to seek sanctuary in Montevideo harbour. The Admiral Graf Spee was critically damaged and with escape impossible on 17 December its Captain Hans Langsdorff ordered his ship to be scuttled in the River Plate. One of the major Allied victories of World War II

Following the battle the Captain of Achilles, William Parry, decided, for safety reasons, to jettison their remaining depth charges. Able Seaman Connew No. NZ1284 volunteered to assist the Gunnery Officer, Lieutenant R.E.Washbourne, in

this dangerous and ultimately successful task. For his act of courage Fred was mentioned in despatches. On his discharge from Achilles Fred was promoted to the rank of 'Master of Arms' based in Wellington and then Littleton, being responsible for recruitment. Following a second posting to Wellington and further promotion to Sub Lieutenant, Fred moved north to be based in Auckland. During this time he married Pat whose brother Edgar, coincidentally, had been a shipmate and friend of Fred on Achilles and who was seriously injured in the Battle of River Plate.

When in Auckland Fred, who had been initiated into the Craft in Wellington, became a Charter Member of the Belmont Lodge No. 335 which was Dedicated on 20 May 1948. He was installed as Master in 1953 and ultimately achieved the rank of Assistant Provincial Grand Master. VW Bro. Fred is described by his peers as a top guy, dignified, great ritualist and always impeccably turned out. There is just one word missing from that list and that is heroic.

A ballot was for the affiliation of Bro. J. Scammell MM of Otari Lodge No. 190. Proposed by Bro. W.J. Stevenson seconded by Bro. C.L. Jewell. The ballot was successful and Bro Scammell was declared duly elected. Being present the Brother was introduced and welcomed by the WM and took his seat as a member of the Lodge.

The business of the evening being ended the Lodge was closed in Peace and Harmony with solemn prayer at 9.20 pm
